Condom Awareness Week at Columbia has been organized. funded, and presented by the Columbia Gay Health Advocacy Project, the Columbia AIDS Peer Educators, and the Office of Health Education of the University Health Service.

## Since 1985, the Columbia **Gay Health Advocacy Project** (CGHAP) has provided extensive AIDS education

programs to the Columbia campus, including AIDS prevention talks each fall on every freshman floor, regular information forums, panel discussions, and safer-sex workshops. CGHAP also provides one-on-one peer counseling on AIDS, anonymous HIV antibody testing, help with AIDS-related harassment and discrimination, and other services to hundreds of members of the University community. With the University Health Service, CGHAP operates a clinic where HIVinfected students can obtain stae-of-the-art medical care and education about treatment options.
